Acts 4: INIV

The priests and the captain of the temple guard and the Sadducees came up to Peter and John while they were speaking to the people.

Who were the priests?

Priests

The priests were the ones who officiated at all the temple sacrifices.

There were 24 groups of priests and each group served for 2 weeks a year in the temple offering sacrifices in the morning and the evening.

Who was the captain of the temple guards?

Captain of the Temple Guards

The temple was strictly policed. The Jewish leaders did not tolerate disorder, so there were temple quards who policed the temple. The Captain of the temple quards would be similar to the Chief of Police.

Who were the Sadducees?

Sadducees

The Sadducees were in charge of the entire temple operation and the priests worked under their leadership. They only believed the Pentateuch was inspired by God, and since there was nothing in the Pentateuch about resurrection, they did not believe in the resurrection of the dead.

Acts 4: 2 NIV

They were greatly disturbed because the apostles were teaching the people, proclaiming in Jesus the resurrection of the dead.

What were they doing that had them so greatly disturbed?

Acts 3: 14 NIV

You disowned the Holy and Righteous One and asked that a murderer be released to you.

Acts 3: 15 NIV

You killed the author of life, but God raised him from the dead. We are witnesses of this.

Acts 3: 16 NIV

By faith in the name of Jesus, this man whom you see and know was made strong. It is Jesus' name and the faith that comes through him that has completely healed him, as you can all see.

Acts 3: 18 NIV

But this is how God fulfilled what he had foretold through all the prophets, saying that his Messiah would suffer.

Acts 3: 19 NIV

Repent, then, and turn to God, so that your sins may be wiped out, that times of refreshing may come from the Lord,

Acts 4: 2 NIV

They **seized** Peter and John and, because it was evening, they put them in jail until the next day.

Acts 4: 4 NIV

But many who heard the message believed; so the number of men who believed grew to about five thousand.

Acts 4: 5-6 NIV

The next day the rulers, the elders and the teachers of the law met in Jerusalem. Annas the high priest was there, and so were Caiaphas, John, Alexander and others of the high priest's family.

Acts 4: 7 NIV

They had Peter and John brought before them and began to question them:

Do you think Peter and John would ever believe they would be given the opportunity to speak to powerful leaders such as these men?

What a perfect question! Who does this show us is in control?

Acts 4:8 NIV

Then Peter, filled with the Holy Spirit, said to them: "Rulers and elders of the people!

If we are being called to account today for an act of kindness shown to a man who was lame and are being asked how he was healed,

then know this, you and all the people of Israel: It is by the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, whom you crucified but whom God raised from the dead, that this man stands before you healed.

Acts 4: 11-12 NIV

Jesus is "'the stone you builders rejected, which has become the cornerstone.' (Psalm 118:22)

Salvation is found in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given to mankind by which we must be saved."

Acts 4: 14-15 NIV

But since they could see the man who had been healed standing there with them, there was nothing they could say. So they ordered them to withdraw from the Sanhedrin and then conferred together.

Note the courage of the healed man that was once lame!

Acts 4: 16 NIV

"What are we going to do with these men?" they asked. "Everyone living in Jerusalem knows they have performed a notable sign, and we cannot deny it.

Acts 4: 17 NIV

But to stop this thing from spreading any further among the people, we must warn them to speak no longer to anyone in this name."

Acts 4: 18 NIV

Then they called them in again and commanded them not to speak or teach at all in the name of Jesus.

What was the main thing they wanted Peter and John to stop doing?

Do you think they telt they solved their problem and Peter and John would no longer speak about Jesus?

Acts 4: 19 NIV

But Peter and John replied, "Which is right in God's eyes: to listen to you, or to him? You be the judges!

Acts 4: 20 NIV

As for us, we cannot help speaking about what we have seen and heard."

1 Peter 2: 13-14 NIV

Submit yourselves for the Lord's sake to every human authority: whether to the emperor, as the supreme authority, or to governors, who are sent by him to punish those who do wrong and to commend those who do right.

Did Peter change his mind?

Acts 4: 21-22 NIV

After further threats they let them go. They could not decide how to punish them, because all the people were praising God for what had happened. For the man who was miraculously healed was over forty years old.

Acts 4: 23 NIV

On their release, Peter and John went back to their own people and reported all that the chief priests and the elders had said to them.

Do you think it is unusual that Peter and John Went back and told the Church about their threats to keep quiet about Jesus?

What was the response of the Church?

Acts 4: 24 NIV

When they heard this, they raised their voices together in prayer to God. "Sovereign Lord," they said, "you made the heavens and the earth and the sea, and everything in

Acts 4: 25-26 NIV

You spoke by the Holy Spirit through the mouth of your servant, our father David: "Why do the nations rage and the peoples plot in vain? The kings of the earth rise up and the rulers band together against the Lord and against his anointed one.

Acts 4: 27 NIV

Indeed Herod and Pontius Pilate met together with the Gentiles and the people of Israel in this city to conspire against your holy servant Jesus, whom you anointed.

Acts 4: 28 NIV

They did what your power and will had decided beforehand should happen.

Now, Lord, consider their threats and enable your servants to speak your word with great boldness.

Acts 4: 30 NIV


Stretch out your hand to heal and perform signs and wonders through the name of your holy servant Jesus."






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
